

Agenda Item 7: Mayor's Drive & Tea Party

BACKGROUND

The Mayor's Drive and Tea Party is a community event which has run since 1947 on the first Wednesday of July. It provides those aged over 75 the opportunity to be driven through the countryside by a volunteer to a venue, given afternoon tea and driven back home again.

The main organiser of this event since 1985 has been Angela Spellman along with a huge number of volunteers who help with the organisation. The event is financially supported by the Mayor's Benevolent Fund.

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, this event hasn't taken place since 2019.

Ambitions were in place for the event to take place in 2022 after the 2 year break. The first step in the organisation process is to ensure there are enough volunteer drivers available for the event to take place. Angela, and her team of organisers has set a target of a minimum of 50 volunteer drivers to make the event viable to go ahead. However, after more than 100 invitations sent to former volunteers, out of 70 responses only 32 of those were positive responses who wished to participate. With time constraints in place, this meant that the decision was made that there would be no Mayor's Drive in 2022.

Following this decision, the organisers then had the opportunity to have a further discussion on the future of the event. After delivering the event for more than 35 years, the organisers have seen how the town has developed, the way community organisations deliver their practice to support residents and have been observant to a number of factors which contribute to the success of the Mayor's Drive & Tea Party. These factors include the age of volunteers (with some being older than the guests attending the event), the need for new equipment to make the event run, safeguarding concerns regarding DBS requirements, increased cost of fuel resulting in less interest, and the declining numbers of volunteer helpers, drivers, and guest attendance over many years. Feedback from the organisers also cited that the pandemic has still played a part in 2022's response rate, as both guests and volunteers still have concerns about Covid-19.

It was after much deliberation that the organisers decided that the Mayor's Drive had run its course and the organisers did not want to pursue the event moving forward.

While this is very sad, the organisers felt that now was a good time for the event to finish following the 2 year hiatus, as getting it back up and running was proving difficult. Angela wrote to all former volunteers, guests and venue hosts to notify them of the news and to thank them for their help and support over the years.

Newbury Town Council would also like to thank Angela Spellman, Sue Kitchener, Empire Café and all other key organisers and volunteers who have played a vital role in making this happen over the years, creating many fond memories for guests, volunteers and former Mayors.

NEED FOR REPORT

As the event has come to an end, this was met with sadness from many but it also means that the Mayor's Benevolent Fund's charity aims need to be reconsidered as the Mayor's Drive & Tea Party was one of their aims.

There have been discussions about the potential for Newbury Town Council to host this event or for Newbury Town Council to host a different event with similarities to the Mayor's Drive, but there are many factors that need to be considered.

The Mayor's Drive & Tea Party relied very heavily on the community and good-will of volunteers who were willing to commit their time, money, and resources to the Mayor's Drive & Tea Party. Newbury Town Council had very little involvement in the organisation of the event. The roles that were fulfilled by volunteer organisers were, but not limited to:

- Arrange the venue for the Tea Party in the grounds of a large country house.
- Invite volunteer drivers to participate in the event.
- Invite guests to the event, including visiting them at their home.
- Assign guests to volunteer drivers, working based off location
- Ensure drivers had all the details of the guests they were attending to
- Organise the afternoon tea boxes
- Help pack the afternoon tea boxes and transport them to the venue
- Work closely with the home-owner of the venue to ensure positioning of gazebos, tables, signage, cars, first aid, toilets.
- To set up the gazebos, toilets, hot water stations
- Put up signage on approach roads to the venue
- Man the entry gate, recording cars, drivers and guests as they arrived
- Hand out afternoon tea boxes to all guests, including special boxes for those with dietary requirements.

Newbury Town Council supported this event by funding from the Mayor's Benevolent Fund, arranging medical cover and providing gazebos and hot water flasks.

Unfortunately, Newbury Town Council does not have the resources, infrastructure or funding to take on the organisation and running of this event in its current form.

OPTIONS CONSIDERED

Options for alternative events have been considered, including moving the event to Victoria Park, however the same logistical issues regarding transport, safeguarding, volunteers, equipment become an issue.

While Newbury Town Council don't have the resources to host the event, it is recommended that we would be in support of a community organisation who wished to run a similar event. We would be able to support in a similar way financially, providing that the event would be of a similar cost to the Mayor's Drive and Tea Party, but we wouldn't be involved in the organisation or administration.

Mayor's Festive Afternoon Tea

In December 2021, the Civic Manager worked with the Mayor of Newbury to host the Mayor's Festive Afternoon Tea in St Nicolas Church Hall. This event was organised, administered and run entirely by Newbury Town Council and had the support of Councillors who volunteered on the day. We welcomed 50 guests for an afternoon of Christmas music, bingo, games and afternoon tea.

While this event was a great success, there were limitations to growing this event further to the scale of the Mayor's Drive. All guests were required to make their own arrangements to and from the venue, guests were limited to 50 due to venue size, invitations for guests were made via a public call out to the Newbury Weekly News, where readers were able to contact the Civic Office to express their interest in attending. Councillors were also offered first opportunity to recommend guests to attend the event; this was taken up by one councillor.

The cost of this event was just under £1000 for venue hire, afternoon tea and prizes for the games; the cost was very similar to that of the Mayor's Drive and Tea Party and fully funded by the Mayor's Benevolent Fund. With the event foundations in place, this would be an event that could be done again, and would be happy to host again, however if it is due to expand, resources need to be considered including a larger venue, volunteers and afternoon tea boxes.

CONSULTATION

The Chairperson and the Civic Manager met with the organisers, Angela Spellman & Sue Kitchener, to learn more about their decision taken. If any community group wished to take on the organisation of the event, they both recommend that the event is not taken on in the current format is has been running.

The organisers said that an event with a similar scope to the Mayor's Festive Afternoon Tea would work moving forward as an event which the Town Council can host, however anything involving the organisation of transportation would lead to further difficulties.

FINANCIAL

The Mayor's Benevolent Fund has been the sponsor of this event every year, and has provided the funds for the Mayor's Drive & Tea Party. This charity account is kept separate from Newbury Town Council's accounts.

It's important to note that much of the cost of putting on this event was absorbed by the kindness of our community, including the use of a venue for free and subsidised costs for the afternoon tea boxes. Trying to replicate a similar event is likely to cost more from the Charity.

If Newbury Town Council were to host an alternative event, or a community group wanted to host an alternative, the Mayor's Benevolent Fund would not be able to offer more than £1,500 per annum. This is a similar cost to that of the Mayor's Drive & Tea Party.

RECCOMENDATION

To approve the recommendation that the Council would support any community organisations who wish to come forward to host The Mayor's Drive or a similar event.

Secretarial support (Agendas, minutes, circulation of information) is provided by Newbury Town Council's Civic Manager.

Quorum of 3 Members at each meeting for decision making, including the Chair.

Goals

- 1. To promote the work of Newbury Town Council by engaging with young people through various youth channels.
 - Work closely with schools and other youth organisations and clubs.
- 2. To promote local democracy and the fundamentals of the Town Council to local primary schools.
 - Contact Newbury local schools, inviting them to learn about Newbury Town
 - Deliver interactive Meet The Town Council sessions with primary school groups in the Town Hall.
- 3. To inform and engage local secondary schools in the democratic processes and the working of their local councils
 - Deliver quality and engaging sessions to secondary school students, facilitating their interest in local issues.
 - Encourage secondary school students to participate in sharing their views on local issues with the Town Council.
- 4. To encourage people of all backgrounds to engage in activities and events which are centred around topics of local interest, encouraging healthy and informative discussions.
 - Engage specifically with local minority and ethnically diverse groups within the
 - Engage with the public through consultations to seek out topics of interest in Newbury.
 - Facilitate the organisation of events which local people can take part in to have their say on local matters which they have raised as part of the consultations.

Deliverables

The Working Group is tasked with delivering to the parent Committee (Civic Pride, Arts and Culture):

- A detailed plan, with clear responsibilities to implement sessions as part of Meet The Town Council Week, targeted at Primary and Secondary schools to take place in the Autumn Term.

- Respond to opportunities to implement sessions to engage local people in discussion events on topics of local interest which they have raised.
- The implementation for the recommendations and actions approved by the parent committee while the Working Group is in action.

Scope/Jurisdiction

Organisations that have a direct impact on the Newbury civic parish, but to be inclusive of those who travel to Newbury for work and education purposes.

Liaison from the Council

Working Group reports to Civic Pride, Arts and Culture Committee.

To advise Full Council of the programme within Meet The Town Council Week and to encourage Member participation closer to the time.

The Local Democracy Working Group has separate budget lines defined within the Annual Budget for the delivery of their activities.

Governance

The Working Group will discuss proposals proposed by members and decide through majority vote, with the Chair's casting vote if necessary.

Additional Notes

Activities for Meet The Town Council events usually take place in the school's Autumn term, in October. The Civic Manager will send invitations to the primary schools at the end of the Spring term, with follow ups at the start of the Autumn term. If sessions are unable to take place, alternative arrangements may be considered. The participation of the Mayor and the Civic Staff play an important part of the primary school visits. The Civic Manager will coordinate all member and staff availability.

Councillors will lead the delivery of presentations for all age groups.

A report of proceedings for Meet The Town Council, and other events, is promoted at Full Council in June to encourage member participation. There are progress and feedback reports at subsequent Civic Pride, Arts and Culture Committee meetings.

The Working Group will communicate through email, phone and at Working Group meetings.

Relevant electronic documentation is stored on the Town Council IT data store.

The group will meet at least 3 times a year, or as required.

These Terms of Reference may be reviewed and changed as necessary by the parent committee.

Agenda Item 14: Baby Loss Awareness Week Report

Context

A request was submitted to the Newbury Town Council contact form from a member of the public asking the Council if they would be interested in supporting Baby Loss Awareness Week.

The request has been put for the Council to consider illuminating Newbury Town Hall in pink & blue colours to support the initiative.

Catherine Kelly, a volunteer with the Forget Me Not Fund (Hampshire Hospitals Foundation Trust's baby loss charity) has made Officers aware of Baby Loss Awareness Week, which is taking place during $9^{th} - 15^{th}$ October 2022.

This year marks the 20th Baby Loss Awareness Week and the milestone is being backed by more than 100 charities and organisations who are illuminating their buildings to raise awareness of the key issues around pregnancy and baby loss in the UK. By raising awareness, the charity are hoping to break the taboo of baby loss and also encourage the call for more tangible improvements in policy, research, bereavement care and support for this topic.

Last year, more than 200 iconic landmarks, municipal buildings, hospitals bridges and stadiums across the UK were lit up in pink and blue to support the campaign.

Within the request, Officers were notified of the global Wave of Light an initiative which takes place at 7pm – 8pm on 15th October which is an internationally recognised Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness Day.

Options Considered

We managed to arrange the up lighting of the Town Hall in March 2022 to show solidarity for Ukraine. This required use of Town Hall electricity and required someone present at all times to ensure health and safety.

If this were to take place, it would be recommended that the Town Hall is lit as part of the Wave of Light initiative on 15th October 7pm – 8pm to ensure that the building is monitored.

Financial

The cost of lighting up the Town Hall would need to be explored. We would consult the cost with the company who provided the up lighting for March 2022.

The cost of an Officer to supervise would need to be factored, considering 15th October is a Saturday and overtime payment would based on receiving time and a half.

Civic Pride, Arts and Culture have a £500 project fund which could be used to fund this project.

Recommendation

To approve the reccomendation that Newbury Town Council participates in the Wave of Light as part of Baby Loss Awareness Week 2022.

Agenda Item 16: Queen's Platinum Jubilee Beacon Lighting

On the 2nd June 2022, Newbury Town Council took part in lighting a beacon to celebrate Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee.

Beacon Lighting events were taking place across the country for this special occasion and it is estimated that Newbury was one of 2000 beacon lighting events taking place on this day.

National guidance was provided to light the beacon at 21:45pm which is when sunset would take place. With commemorations taking place late in the evening, to give the event more of a community focus we intended to have Newbury's beacon lighting event include community choirs and children's funfair rides at the event to build up to the commemorations. We arranged for the Victoria Park Kiosk to remain open and for the Wharf toilets to stay open until late in the evening.

The event was very well marketed, with a good portion of the event budget going towards event promotion with Newbury Weekly, Round and About and Muddy Stilettos.

The event was also supported by Kennet Radio who provided sound requirements and the PA System.

The event began at 7pm, with entertainment in the evening from Sing for Fun, VoxFresh, VoxSonix and Newbury Rock Choir until 9:20pm. From 9:30pm, beacon lighting commemorations took place which included a piper and bugler performing specially composed music for the occasion, a speech from the Mayor and the beacon being lit by the Town Hall Officer which was in the centre of Victoria Park Pond.

There were a few inconveniences on the day. Unfortunately, on the day the funfair was unable to be present due to their vehicle breaking down on the M4 on the way to the event; however, this did not affect the event too much as there was a larger fun fair based on Faraday Road.

There was also confusion regarding the Wharf Toilets which were closed for a short period of time during the event for which we didn't realise that this was due to them being cleaned. This resulted in miscommunication with the public about which toilets were available nearby.

The budget for this event was £1,500. On reflection, more budget for this event could have been considered to make provisions for portaloos, staging and lighting.

Newbury Sea Cadets also had 10 volunteers who supported the event by assisting with stewarding and raising money for the Mayor's Benevolent Fund and the Mayor's chosen charities. They handed out Jubilee pin badges, Union Jack flags and encouraged the public to get photos with our card board cut out of The Queen. This was a great success and they

raised over £300. At the time of writing this report, the Mayor is due to visit the Unit to thank them for their efforts.

A special thanks needs to be extended to all the Councillors who volunteered as stewards on the evening, as well as our Town Hall Officer for lighting the beacon and supporting the set up and pack down of this event.

Overall, the event itself was a success. It was estimated that around 500 people were in attendance for the beacon lighting ceremony, with lots of people slowly arriving to the Park during the event build up which really brought the community together.

Agenda Item 17: Civic Awards 2022 Report

The 2022 Newbury Town Civic Awards were launched in the middle of January 2022. A press release launched the awards, and the Newbury Town Council website was updated to allow for online nomination forms to be completed. In addition, advertising of the awards included letters & emails to charities and leisure organisations, posters in notice boards and bus stops as well as social media posts highlighting each award.

Nominations were open for 4 weeks when we received the following nominations:

- Newbury Town Civic Award 9
- Young Persons Civic Award 0
- Business Civic Award 4
- Environmental Contribution Civic Award 4

Nominations for the Young Persons Civic Award were extended by 48 hours, with one nomination coming in. At the end of the nomination period, we had **18** award nominations, one more than 2021's awards.

Despite our best-efforts contacting schools, youth organisations, clubs, churches and going through mayoral letters that were previously send to young people; it was disappointing that the Young Person's Civic Award only received one nomination which was received during the extension period. It's worth considering how we can promote this award further and would be open for any new ideas on how this could be done.

Judges were the Mayor of Newbury, the Chairperson of the Civic Pride, Arts and Culture Committee, and Alison Drummond, Operations Manager at the Newbury BID. Judging took place online via Zoom; while all nominations were very strong this year, judges were unanimous in their decisions for award winners.

All nominees were invited to the Town Hall to the Civic Awards Presentation Evening on Wednesday 16TH March. This would be the first time the Civic Awards would be hosted as a stand-alone event, as it has previously been hosted with the Annual Town Meeting.

The winners of the awards were as follows:

- Sukey Russell-Hayward, Newbury Town Civic Award
- Soorya Anbumurasoli, Young Person's Civic Award
- The Globe Pub, Business Civic Award
- Tony Hammond, Environmental Contribution Civic Award

All winners were present to receive their awards apart from The Globe Pub who were on a staff retreat. They sent the Civic Manager a video which was played at the event which went down very well with the audience.

The format of the awards as a stand-alone event worked very well. With around 50 people in attendance in the Council Chamber; the awards themselves took around 30 minutes leaving plenty time for networking and the buffet afterwards. The event finished at 8:45pm.

Feedback from the event has been very strong. With good feedback, and only minor technical issues which weren't noticeable to the public, I was very happy with the outcome of this event and the format of how it worked.

One observation that will have to be taken into account is the amount of space in the Chamber. In the future, if we receive more nomination or would like to extend the invite list to the award nominators or more dignitaries we would need to consider an alternative venue to meet the capacity of attendance.

I would strongly advocate for the Civic Awards to continue as a stand-alone event moving forwards.
