

A Brief Outline of the Newbury Twin Town Association

Newbury Town Council has twinned with 5 European towns:

| Braunfels in Germany | since 1963/64 |
|----------------------------|---------------|
| Bagnols-sur-Ceze in France | since 1970 |
| Eeklo in Belgium | since 1977 |
| Feltre in Italy | since 2002 |
| Carcaixent in Spain | since 2019 |

Unusually all of our Twin Towns are twinned with each other, and a couple of other towns are also involved in our twinning activities: Kiskunfelegyhaza in Hungary and Zamosc in Poland. Shortly after the first twinning with Braunfels, the Twin Town Association was formed to develop and maintain links to our Twin Towns, on behalf of the Town Council.

All our members (we have around 100) are volunteers, and pay £10 each or £20 for a family each year as a subscription. The Association has not received any funding from the Council for a number of years now, and is currently self-sufficient, although following Brexit, grants from the EU will no longer be available.


NTTA activities since February 2020 and forthcoming events

Sadly, due to the pandemic, all seven of our twinning events due to be held in 2020 have been postponed for two years, though we currently hope that the following events will take place in 2022:

- Welcoming 30 Eeklo students to Newbury for a guided tour and lunch on 30 March 2022
- Eeklo Belgium in April 2022
- Bagnols France in May 2022
- Zamosc in Poland in July 2022
- 40 young people (aged 18 25) from all the linked countries will be invited to spend a week in Newbury (Thirtover Place) in August 2022. We are looking for more Newbury participants.
- Feltre in August 2022
- Carcaixent in September 2022

Despite the pandemic the Association has had a number of social activities in 2021 including a garden party, a walking tour of our Twin Towns (well, streets in Newbury named after them!), regular coffee mornings in Angelica's Café, Camp Hopson, and a well-attended Christmas Dinner at the Bowlers Arms.

On Saturday 5th February we were pleased to host a coffee morning at the Town Hall for the first time in two years, where one member also raised funds for Stroke Care Newbury, and the Association would like



to thank the Mayor for gifting the use of the Council Chamber. On the same day we held our Annual General Meeting, attended by the Mayor and 30 members of the Association. After the business part of the meeting everyone enjoyed a tasty buffet prepared by members.

Publicising the Association

We are a very friendly organisation and welcome new members. Despite restrictions in the last few years, we have had a handful of new members join us, and we have publicised ourselves in the following ways:

- I was interviewed by Kennet Radio on 'Saturday Chatterday'
- We had a stall at the Speen Village Fete, with free competitions for adults and children and engaged with dozens of people
- We had excellent coverage of our 'Twin Town Walking Tour' in the Newbury Weekly News
- Radio Berkshire interviewed colleagues from our Twin Towns on two occasions during the year for items on Coronavirus and Climate Change.
- We have a new website
- Our coffee morning was advertised on Social media

<u>Membership</u>

Membership is open to all local residents who enjoy taking part in visiting our Twin Towns or welcoming visitors to Newbury, and a few town councillors are members – but we would welcome more! Activities are publicised in our newsletters, social media and by email. We are also very keen to hear from organisations within Newbury who would like to know more about our Twin Towns, or are keen to visit. In the past we have helped arrange concerts for choirs and exchanges for individuals and groups.

NTTA and NTC

The Association is still looking forward to seeing Carcaixent added to the Newbury 'welcome' signs, following the twinning in 2019. Additionally, we had been in discussion with the Civic Manager about an installation in Victoria Park to celebrate our Twin Towns. The suggestion of a sun dial was broached, not just to include mention of our Twin Towns, but to commemorate those in Newbury and our Twins that have died in the Pandemic, which is pertinent as we lost two of our much-loved members last year.

Agenda Item 8: Newbury Town Trails

Background

During 2021, Newbury Town Council worked closely with Newbury BID to produce a pilot scheme for the Newbury Town Trails initiative.

Newbury Town Trails is an umbrella term for a series of local maps, trails and walks of local interest, categorised into different themes. Newbury Town Trails aim to celebrate and encourage the appreciation of Newbury's cultural heritage, arts and businesses.

In September 2021, two maps were produced and soft launched under the Newbury Town Trails theming; a Public Art & Blue Plaque trail (information collated by Newbury Town Council) and a Vegan trail (information collated by Newbury BID). Both maps were produced with shared branding with Newbury Town Council and the Newbury BID and were distributed to local businesses and tourist attractions in the town.

Current Position

Public feedback from both maps has been good; the content of the maps and the trails themselves have been enjoyed by many, and the maps have been used by members of the public in the town – though it is unclear whether this is to participate in the trail or because they need use of a local map. The project has been very well received, and it is one which is of benefit for businesses, promoting history and culture, and local tourism. It is recommended that we continue producing the maps following this pilot period.

Where there could be improvements, for both maps, would be the design of the map graphic. This includes improving the accuracy of the scale of the map, more eligible text and less icons which aren't distracting from the content of the map. To make these changes they would have to be done directly with the graphic designer we used to create the map; however, they did struggle to maintain our required deadlines for map production (there was an aim to have them both ready for July 2021) and they weren't efficient in their use of production time which made the project more costly than it should have been.

Because of this, moving forward, it is proposed to begin using a different designer which the BID have sourced and used on previous occasion to recreate the internal map design. This will be more cost-effective and will provide smarter, more efficient working for any edits required due to the BID's pre-existing relationship with the designer. The content of the trail and the information pages will remain the same.

While the Public Art & Blue Plaque Map has been well received, it has been suggested that the two topics are separated into two different maps. This would provide more scope and information to be included as a part of two separate maps instead of being squeezed into one map. For example, the Blue Plaque Trail would benefit from having additional information the printed map with a more accurate location of where the plaque is situated; and the Public Art Trail could include pictures alongside the body of text.

By Summer 2022, it's aimed to have a Blue Plaque Trail and a Public Art Trail to go alongside the already existing Vegan Trail and, the BID's newest project in the series they wish to produce, the Dog-Friendly Businesses Trail.

Consultation

The Civic Manager has consulted the Democratic Services Officer who is the Lead Officer for the Heritage Working Group who is in agreement that a Blue Plaque Trail map would be a better option going forward for this project.

Financial

There is £1000 in the Civic Pride, Arts and Culture Budget that can contribute to the Newbury Town Trails project.

Recommendation

To Resolve that Newbury Town Trails Public Art & Blue Plaque Map is split so that two separate maps are created for 2022's launch in the Summer.

Agenda Item 12: Mayor's Festive Afternoon Tea – Report

The Mayor's Festive Afternoon Tea took place on Thursday 16th December 2021, 2pm – 4pm in St Nicholas Church Hall.

The event was held as an alternative to the Mayor's Drive and Tea Party which usually takes place in the Summer but was not held this year due to the uncertainty over Covid 19. This alternative event was proposed for the Mayor to host later in the year for residents over 75 years of age. St Nicholas Church Hall was booked to accommodate more guests than the Council Chamber, and as a more accessible venue.

As the Mayor's Drive and Tea Party is organised externally, this event which was fully produced in house required us to create an invitation strategy. The fairest method to do this was to do a call out which invited members of the public who fit the criteria to contact the Civic Office to book their place to attend, with it being a private event accessed only by ticketed entry. Doing this, we had an accurate idea of numbers which supported how much food we would require to order.

A press release was issued 5 weeks before the event took place, with final numbers required 1 week prior to the event. With 7 days to go before the event, we had a total of 50 guests express interest in attending, tickets were posted to all attendees for them to bring on the day. A condition of attending was that all guests had to provide their own transport to and from the venue, this was not provided.

On the day, we had 43 guests in attendance. Each guest was welcomed by the Mayor and Mayoress, and were offered a welcome drink before taking to their seats for afternoon tea. Catering was provided by Casual Dining by John who arranged individual Christmas afternoon tea boxes.

Once guests had finished their afternoon tea, entertainment was provided and arranged inhouse; as well as Christmas music playing in the background, the Town Crier hosted a game of bingo and encouraged tables to take part in a group quiz. Prizes were also given out to the oldest lady and gent present, and a random prize draw was done for 3 guests to win £25 Tesco vouchers.

Verbal feedback was given to volunteers and the Mayor upon exit, all seemed to thoroughly enjoy their day. It was a very nice, wholesome event to host which got everyone into the festive spirit.

The total cost of hosting the event was just under £1000. This includes hire of St Nics Hall, food, prizes and entertainment. This cost is very much similar to that of the Mayor's Drive & Tea Party and was fully funded by the Mayor's Benevolent Fund.

The Civic Manager put a volunteer call out to all Councillors who would like to take part and support the event, this was positively received. Roles included meeting and greeting upon arrival, pouring of welcome drinks, serving of tea or coffee, clear up and wash up after service and pack down and tidy of the venue once the event is finished.

All volunteers deserve a huge thank you for all their support for this event, without their support this event would not have been able to take place.

Agenda Item 13: 2021 Christmas Carol Service Report

On Sunday 19th December 2021, we worked alongside St Nicolas' Church for the Mayor of Newbury's annual Carol Service attendance which started at 6pm.

St Nicolas Church was last used for the carol service in 2019. We followed the same protocol that was used for 2019's service to keep proceedings on a casual basis in respect of their wishes and usual arrangements.

Invitations were sent out to dignitaries, former Mayor's and Councillors one month in advance of the event. 23 people were in attendance on the day. This included the Mayor of Thatcham. Apologies were received on the evening from the Chairman of West Berkshire Council and our MP. We received many apologies for this year's event due to the uncertainty of the new strain of Covid 19, and with illnesses.

Proceedings took place in the Town Hall where light refreshments were available from 5pm and an informal procession lead by our Town Marshal took place to arrive at the church for 5:45pm. Seating at the front of the church was reserved for the Mayor's Party.

With a slight delay in start time (due to the 4:30pm service overrunning), the 6pm service took place as planned by the church, with the Mayor of Newbury delivering a reading.

Refreshments were served in the Town Hall after the service, something which we have done for the first time, where mince pies and sherry were available. One observation which is noted for the future is ensuring that those leaving the church all leave together to process back to the Town Hall.
